

APPLICATION FROM NATIONALS OF NON-MEMBER  
STATES FOR PERMANENT EMPLOYMENT WITH THE  
INTERNATIONAL SECRETARIAT

REPORT OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The General Committee, at its meeting on Thursday, 7 February 1946, considered a memorandum submitted by the Executive Secretary on applications for employment with the permanent Secretariat from nationals of non-Member States.

The Committee agreed that, while under the present ruling there could be no question of actually employing nationals of non-Member States, there might be some advantage in filing such applications, since if a country not now a Member of the United Nations were subsequently admitted to membership, it would naturally desire to be represented on the Secretariat as soon as possible after its election.

The General Committee therefore recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the following Resolution:

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY INSTRUCTS THE SECRETARY-GENERAL:

1. To receive and file such applications for employment with the Secretariat as may be received from nationals of non-Member States.
2. To inform the Governments of non-Member States making enquiry with regard to applications for employment that such applications will be received and filed, but that employment can only take place in accordance with the regulations of the Secretariat.
