## Report of the Fifth Committee

Rapporteur: Mr. David SILVEIRA da MOTA (Brazil)

- 1. At its 1169th meeting, held on 15 December 1966, the Fifth Committee considered a statement of financial implications submitted by the Secretary-General relating to the above question (A/C.5/1105), including a proposal contained in the draft resolution (A/6579, para. 14) concerning an international conference or seminar on the problems of apartheid, racial discrimination and colonialism in southern Africa. The Chairman of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions made an oral report on behalf of that Committee.
- 2. The Fifth Committee decided to inform the General Assembly that, should the proposal be adopted, it would require an additional appropriation in the amount of \$60,600 under section 2 of the 1967 budget estimates. The Fifth Committee would advise the General Assembly that, should the seminar or conference be held away from Headquarters, it would expect any additional costs which might arise to be borne by the host Government, in accordance with General Assembly resolution 2116 (XX).
- 3. The Fifth Committee was informed that no firm plans had yet been formulated concerning the possible holding of sessions of the Special Committee on the Policies of Apartheid of the Government of the Republic of South Africa away from Headquarters

cr the possible undertaking of a mission by a sub-committee, and that it was therefore not possible, at this time, to determine any estimate of related costs.

4. In these circumstances, the Fifth Committee would recommend that the Secretary-General be authorized to incur any necessary expenditures which might arise for these purposes under the provisions of the resolution on unforeseen and extraordinary expenses in 1967 with the prior concurrence of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions.
