Note by the Secretary-General

The Secretary-General has the honour to inform the Members of the United Nations and the General Assembly that he has received a communication from the Government of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics stating that as Professor Fedor Ivanovich Kozhevnikov has been nominated for election to the International Court of Justice, that Government has decided to replace him by Professor Sergei Borisovich Krylov as its national candidate for election to the International Law Commission.

The Secretary-General has also the honour to communicate herewith to the Members of the United Nations and to the General Assembly a supplementary list of candidates nominated by the governments of Member States, received since the issuance of document A/2399/Add.2, as well as an additional statement of qualifications of a candidate transmitted by a nominating government.

Additional Statement of Qualifications of a Candidate

KRYLOV - Professor Sergei Borisovich (Union of Soviet Socialist Republics)

Born in 1888.

Graduated in 1910 from the Faculty of Law of the University of St. Petersburg; is a Doctor of Laws and Professor of Public and Private International Law. Has lectured for thirty years on public and private international law.

Was a delegate to the conferences at Dumbarton Oaks (1944) and San Francisco (1945); took part as an adviser in the deliberations of the Committee of Jurists in Washington (1945) and in those of the Executive Committee of the United Nations, also took part in the work of the first session of the General Assembly of the United Nations.

Was a judge of the International Court of Justice from 1946 to 1952.

At the present time is a professor of international law at higher educational institutions in Moscow.

Is the author of a number of technical works on public and private international law.
