## INTRODUCTION

1. The present report is submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with operative paragraph 2 of General Assembly resolution 2352 (XXII) of 19 December 1967.
2. By resolution 845 (IX), adopted by the General Assembly on 22 November 1954, Member States were invited to extend to the inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories their offers of facilities not only for study and training of university standard but, in the first place, for study at the post-primary level as well as technical and vocational training of immediate practical value.
3. Under the terms of resolution 845 (IX) and other resolutions relating to scholarships which were adopted in subsequent years,<sup>1/</sup> the Secretary-General submitted to the General Assembly reports containing information on offers of scholarships made by Member States to inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories. The present report is the thirteenth of its kind and covers the period from October 1967 to October 1968.

### I. SCHOLARSHIPS OFFERED AND AWARDED

#### Offering States

4. Up to October 1968, twenty-seven Member States had made scholarships available for the use of inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories in response to the General Assembly resolutions mentioned above. These Member States are: Brazil, Bulgaria, Burma, Ceylon, Cyprus, Czechoslovakia, Ghana, Greece, Hungary, India, Iran, Israel, Italy, Mexico, Pakistan, Philippines, Poland, Romania, Sierra Leone, Tunisia, Turkey, Uganda, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United Arab Republic, United States of America, Venezuela and Yugoslavia.

Offers and awards

5. Information regarding the scholarships offered by Member States up to October 1967 and the extent to which they were utilized is contained in the previous reports submitted to the General Assembly.
6. Up-to-date information concerning offers of scholarships and awards granted by Member States following the submission of the previous report was requested by the Secretary-General in a note dated 18 July 1968, addressed to the Member States that had offered scholarships in previous years.
7. The information received by the Secretary-General since the previous report is noted below:

BURMA

In a note dated 23 January 1968, the Permanent Representative of Burma informed the Secretary-General that the grant of scholarships to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories had been temporarily suspended by his Government pending the completion of arrangements for the reorganization of the education system, and for the use of the Burmese language as a medium of instruction in all educational and technical institutions in Burma. On completion of these arrangements the Permanent Representative would inform the Secretary-General accordingly so that the grant of scholarships to African students might be pursued further.

CEYLON

In a note dated 17 September 1968, the Permanent Representative of Ceylon informed the Secretary-General that three scholarships would be available to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories for 1969.

CYPRUS

The Permanent Mission of Cyprus, in a note dated 5 August 1968, informed the Secretary-General that the Republic of Cyprus had decided to offer one two-year scholarship to inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories at the Republic's Forestry College for the academic years 1969-1970 and 1970-1971.

#### CZECHOSLOVAKIA

In a note dated 28 March 1968, the Permanent Representative of the Czechoslovak Socialist Republic informed the Secretary-General that, as in the preceding year, his Government had made forty scholarships available to inhabitants of dependent Territories for the academic year 1968-1969. Of this number, twenty had been offered to students of Non-Self-Governing and Trust Territories without specific territorial qualification.

#### GREECE

The Permanent Mission of Greece, in a note dated 9 September 1968, informed the Secretary-General that no students from Non-Self-Governing Territories had applied to the Greek Government during the current year. The offer of two scholarships a year made to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories by the Greek Institute of Government Scholarships remained open.

#### ITALY

The Permanent Representative of Italy, in a note dated 3 October 1968, informed the Secretary-General that two scholarships made available by his Government to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories had been granted to two students from Angola for the academic year 1968-1969.

#### PAKISTAN

In a note dated 8 July 1968, the Permanent Mission of Pakistan informed the Secretariat of the United Nations that the Government of Pakistan had allocated six places in Pakistan medical colleges for students from Trust and Non-Self-Governing Territories for the academic year beginning on 1 September 1968 as follows: Fiji - 1; Southern Rhodesia - 1; Namibia - 1; Non-Self-Governing Territories - 1; United Nations Trust Territories - 1; and Oman - 1.

#### POLAND

In a note dated 6 September 1968, the Permanent Mission of the Polish People's Republic informed the Secretary-General that in the course of the 1967-1968

academic year there were in Poland twenty-six students from Oman attending secondary technical schools and four other students from that Territory studying in the Polish institutions of higher learning. Apart from the above-mentioned students, there were fifteen others from Namibia attending secondary technical schools and two students from Namibia as well as seven students from Angola studying in the institutions of higher learning. The Polish Government granted full-expense scholarships to all the above-mentioned students.

#### ROMANIA

The Permanent Representative of the Socialist Republic of Romania, in a note dated 23 April 1968, informed the Secretary-General that his Government had approved ten higher education scholarships for citizens of Non-Self-Governing Territories and for citizens coming from South Africa, South West Africa and Territories under Portuguese administration for the academic year 1968-1969.

#### SIERRA LEONE

The Permanent Representative of Sierra Leone informed the Secretary-General in a note dated 20 August 1968, that his Government continued to support whole-heartedly the ideas and principles of educating and training non-white South Africans, Namibians and Rhodesian Africans. However, the Government of Sietta Leone, while not withdrawing from the scheme, was unable to participate actively in the offer of such scholarships. It was hoped that in the near future such active participation would again be possible.

#### UNION OF SOVIET SOCIALIST REPUBLICS

The Permanent Mission of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, in a note dated 16 September 1968, informed the Secretary-General that 76 students from Angola, 33 from Guinea (Bissau), 18 from Mozambique, 8 from Namibia, 20 from Oman and 63 from other Non-Self-Governing Territories studied in the Soviet Union during the academic year 1967-1968. The Permanent Mission further informed the Secretary-General that the following students had graduated in 1967 from educational institutions in the USSR: 4 from Angola, 6 from Guinea (Bissau), 3 from Oman,

5 from Southern Rhodesia and 2 from other colonial Territories. It also confirmed that there had been no change in conditions for accepting foreign citizens from colonial and dependent countries to study in the Soviet Union.

#### UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

In a note dated 20 September 1968, the Permanent Representative of the United States of America informed the Secretary-General that a total of 60 new grants for university studies, 5 for teaching or teacher development, 9 for practical experience and training, and 20 for observation and consultation,<sup>2/</sup> were made to persons from Non-Self-Governing Territories under programmes of the United States Department of State for the fiscal year 1967. The Department's educational and cultural exchange programmes provided opportunities in more than 150 fields of specialization for university study, teaching and teacher development, research, practical experience and training, and observation and consultation.

In addition to these scholarship opportunities under the Department's programmes, there were private scholarships available in the United States and elsewhere for students from Non-Self-Governing Territories. In the case of private scholarships, financial support varied with the terms of the grant. Most scholarships for foreign students at the secondary level were provided under private auspices. The most extensive of these was the American Field Service programme.

During the academic year 1966-1967, a total of 5,116 students from Non-Self-Governing and other Territories enrolled in institutions of higher learning in the United States of America was: Angola - 33; Mauritius - 17;<sup>3/</sup> Mozambique - 38; Portuguese Guinea - 2; Seychelles - 8; Southern Rhodesia - 26<sup>4/</sup>; Swaziland - 22;<sup>4/</sup> Hong Kong - 3,578; Macao - 29; Portuguese Timor - 1; Ryukyu Islands - 185; Bahama Islands - 126; Bermuda - 113; British Honduras - 89; Cayman, Turks and Caicos Islands - 37; Leeward Islands - 145; Windward Islands - 142; Aden - 19;<sup>5/</sup>

Fiji Islands - 68; New Hebrides - 1; Niue - 1; and Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands - 198. These students had been provided with financial support from government or private sources.

In addition, there were 64 scholars as follows: Mauritius - 1; Southern Rhodesia - 3; Swaziland - 2; Hong Kong - 43; Macao - 4; Ryukyu Islands 5; Bahama Islands - 1; Bermuda - 1; Cayman, Turks and Caicos Islands - 1; Windward Islands - 2; and Nauru - 1.

## II. APPLICATIONS MADE THROUGH THE UNITED NATIONS

8. In accordance with the procedure established in General Assembly resolution 1696 (XVI) of 19 December 1961, applications for scholarships received by the United Nations Secretariat from inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories were transmitted simultaneously to the offering States for consideration and to the administering Powers for information.
9. During the period under review, 274 students requested and received information and application forms from the Secretariat.
10. Thirty-nine of these applications were duly completed and returned to the Secretariat and forwarded to the offering States concerned in accordance with established procedure. All applications forwarded to offering States came from Southern Rhodesia.
11. The applications were for scholarships offered by the following countries (the number of applications for each country is given in parentheses): Burma (5); Ceylon (1); Czechoslovakia (3); Ghana (2); India (1); Pakistan (11); Tunisia (1); Turkey (1); Uganda (1); and United States (13).
12. It should be noted that applicants who desire to study in Ghana, India, Poland, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, the United Arab Republic or the United States are requested in the information sent to them to apply directly to the Governments concerned and that only a limited number of applications for study in these countries are received by the Secretariat. A number of other offering States also receive applications directly from students from Non-Self-Governing Territories.
13. Offers extended under General Assembly resolution 845 (IX) are communicated to the administering Powers in accordance with resolution 1696 (XVI) to enable them to give appropriate publicity to the offers in the Territories under their administration. Information on the offers is also included in the handbook, Study Abroad (XVIII), 1968-1969, 1969-1970, published by UNESCO.
