PROPOSED PROGRAMME BUDGET FOR THE BIENNIUM 1980-1981

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON ENHANCING THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE PRINCIPLE OF NON-USE OF FORCE IN INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Administrative and financial implications of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/34/L.3

Statement submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly

- 1. The Sixth Committee, at its 23rd meeting held on 22 October 1979, adopted the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/34/L.3. It had before it a statement of financial implications (A/C.6/34/L.4).
- 2. Under the terms of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/34/L.3, the General Assembly would, inter alia,
- (a) Decide that the Special Committee should continue its work, with the goal of drafting at the earliest possible date a world treaty on the non-use of force in international relations, as well as the peaceful settlement of disputes or such other recommendations as the Committee deems appropriate;
- (b) Invite the Governments which have not yet done so to communicate their comments or suggestions, or to bring them up to date, in accordance with General Assembly resolution 31/9;
- (c) Request the Secretary-General to provide the Special Committee with the necessary facilities and services, including the preparation of summary records of the meetings of the Committee.
- 3. The estimated costs provided hereunder are based on the following assumptions:
 - (a) The meetings would be held in New York from 7 April 1980 to 2 May 1980;

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- (b) During the meetings facilities would be provided in four languages (English, French, Russian and Spanish); however, pre-session documentation would be in five languages the four mentioned above and Chinese and post-session documentation would be in six languages.
- 4. Based on the above assumptions, the estimated costs would be as follows:
